

Both organizations combine elements and best practices that incorporate them into what AMPP believes will be a world-class contractor program.

Painters District Council 14 and Celestial Ministries partnered with Prison Fellowship's Annual Angel Tree Program to fulfill the holiday wishes of hundreds of kids with a parent in prison. Through Angel Tree, children of the incarcerated receive a gift on that parent's behalf during the holiday season.

Celestial Ministries, a nonprofit organization, explains their mission as one "to serve and increase the quality of life for individuals and families that live in single parent homes. Celestial offers several community programs and services including Celestial's Mobile Outreach, Celestial's Community Garden, After School Programs and the Celestial Sound Studio. These programs are designed to keep families connected and raise the next generation of leaders, while building within them real skills and provide a creative outlet to express themselves."

Through their Mobile Outreach program, families receive help with transportation to correctional facilities across the state in order to stay connected during a parent's incarceration period. This helps to maintain an emotional balance with children and other family members who might otherwise not see a parent for long periods of time.

With the support of our sponsors last year, over 900 children received a gift on behalf of their otherwise absent parent. Families also received a ham or turkey and a bag of groceries for the holidays.

Despite the obvious challenges of collecting donations amidst the pandemic we managed to pass along peace and love by collecting over 650 presents and gift cards. We provided curbside pickup for Angel Tree gifts, and they have all been passed along to children on behalf of their incarcerated parent. 100 families also received

their turkey or ham as well as stockings for all the kids.

Thank you to everyone involved in making this a wonderful holiday for the kids and their families.

Our DC14 sister, Veronica Leal, wallcovering, decorative and wood finishing instructor at the school, was featured in this episode. Her story is the American dream, arriving in the U.S. as a young woman from Mexico who made a life for herself in the union with a foundation of hard work and well-honed skills. Veronica is a great example of the career opportunities available to union members having worked her way up from an early Job Corps introduction to the trades, to an apprenticeship with DC14, becoming a journeyperson installer in high demand and eventually earning the position of instructor at our school.

Many members know veronica, whether they worked alongside her or came up as an apprentice under her guidance, but not everyone will find something new to learn about her in this feature segment.







Westside Cleanup featuring Mike Dixon (Ep 4 @ 08:09) Aired March 28th

Members of Painters District Council 14 gathered in the North Lawndale Neighborhood Community to help cleanup local areas impacted by protests over the senseless murder of George Floyd in Minneapolis. They joined an amazing outpouring of North Lawndale and other concerned Chicagoland residents totaling over a thousand people, far more than the anticipated 100-200 volunteers.

Mike Dixon, Business Agent from DC14, procured many volunteers from his local 1332, as well as others. He was able to secure donated supplies for the cleanup from the district council and Finishing Chicago in the form of brooms, shovels, dust pans, gloves, safety glasses and boxes of construction-grade trash bags. Finishing Chicago was able to bring in a film crew to document the event for this episode of ABC's Built to Last television series.








The Painters' Bridge featuring the industrial division of DC14's Apprentice Program (Ep 7 @ 21:53) Aired April 11th

DC14 has had success recently in turning several non-union industrial jobs. They have been targeting municipal water programs with the help of Finishing Chicago, the Tri-County Defense Fund, Corrosion Illinois and some new laws in place affecting "community water supplies." Building on this initiative, the industrial division of the school is ramping up to train the labor force needed for the anticipated workload.

In 2020, Dan Penski, Director of Training, orchestrated the construction of a bridge mock-up with Joe Tyrakowski, DC14's Industrial Painting Instructor and the iron workers for the apprenticeship program. The bridge was assembled in the industrial practical area and will allow apprentices invaluable hands-on training for containment and safety rigging.

The push is on to bolster the ranks of our industrial contractors and this bridge is an incredible asset to the training of the next generation of industrial painters!










The Des Plaines Theater Renovation (Ep 8 @ 15:00) Aired May 2nd

This episode highlights the skillset of our commercial painting prowess as it follows a crew from All-Tech Decorating as they renovate the iconic Des Plaines Theater which opened its doors on August 9th, 1925 with a silent movie showing of "Are Parents People?" The building has been in a state of disrepair for the last decade and was purchased by the city two years ago with the goal of reimagining the space as a cultural center.

Mike LeGood, General Superintendent All-Tech decorating, summed up the project, "The building is so unique in itself with all the niches, with all the intricacies that are coming along with this, it takes a special crew to be able to do this work."

A special metallic latex acrylic was used on the walls at approximately \$250 per gallon. The use of lifts and effort to maintain a consistent spray coverage demonstrates the ability highly-skilled union labor at its best. And the film crew did a great job of capturing the detailed architecture of this magnificent venue!

A HAPPY AND WELL-DESERVED

RETIREMENT

A fter 45 years of being a proud Union member John Spiros Jr. decided to take a step back relax and enjoy the retired life. Many people remember John as either their instructor at the school, Business Representative at Local Union 147, business manager/secretary treasurer, or someone they can turn to when they needed guidance or help with any issue.

John was initiated into Painters' District Council #14, Local Union #147, as an apprentice in August of 1976. John always said his step brother Leo Tock, who was at that time the Business Manager/Secretary-Treasurer of District Council #14, told him I will help get your foot in the door but what you do with that opportunity after that is up to you.....and wow did he do a lot with that!!

John completed his apprenticeship and worked in the field until he accepted a position as a Painting Instructor Washburne Trade School in 1981. As an instructor John found his calling and remained a favorite of our future Journeyman Union members. I can't tell you how many times we have heard a member (some now retiring) tell us John Spiros was their instructor when they started as an apprentice and how much they learned from him. Anyone that knows John will tell you that teaching side of him is alive and well. If you ask Johns advice on a project or any question, the part of him that enjoys educating and sharing his knowledge comes out, and you will learn a lesson you did not sign up for but will appreciate.

In 1990 John was elected Business Representative of Local Union 147. This was also a position John would thrive in and again quickly became the Representative that members would go to with any problems. John's priority was and has always been the members, so anyway he could help advocate or elevate a them he

was there. I can't tell you how many members came in asking for him through the years and he always took the time to help each of them no matter what Local they were in or problem they had.

Through his career he has also been very involved with Local Union 147. He held many positions there from delegate to President of the Local. He always pushed his members to attend Local meetings, take upgrading classes to improve their skills, and volunteer for as many projects as they could. He ran the Local Union 147 picnic (amongst other programs) until 2005 when he pushed for newly elected Business Manager/Secretary-Treasurer Terry Fitzmaurice to turn it into the District Council Picnic. After Terry gave the go-ahead John put everything together, organized and managed the first District Council picnic. Just to be clear he did not just organize the event and make everyone else work he is a man that gets his hands dirty and works just as hard as everyone involved. John was there at sunup until sundown setting up and cleaning up in what ended to be the hottest day of the year with temperatures exceeding 100 degrees.

As a Business Representative John did many programs for the membership. Another program he started from the ground up was the STAR program. When Terry Fitzmaurice became BMST he wanted the council to start their own Safety Training Awards program and again John took the initiative to research and create our own STAR requirements and event. The first star banquet was held in 2007 thanks to his work.



CERTIFICATION PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The information provided below is a brief overview of key elements of the AGMT Certification Program. For complete detail, Pleas see the AGMT Candidate Handbook @ agmtprogram.com

Introduction: The Architectural Glass & Metal Technician (AGMT) program is a ANSI accredited personnel certification process featuring a third-party, independent assessment of a glazier's knowledge and ability. AGMT tests experienced glaziers' fundamental knowledge, skills, and abilities through written and hands-on assessments.


Glazing Technician Competencies: There are 7 major categories that are assessed by the AGMT Certification Program.

















Sealants & Gaskets, etc.

QC & Failure Prevention

Program Prerequisites: The AGMT Certification is designed to validate the knowledge, skills, and abilities of an experienced glazier. In order to become an candidate for certification, and applicant must first meet the below Prerequisites:

Panels



Read and sign the **AGMT Candidate** Agreement



Possess OSHA 10 certification or higher



Demonstrate at least 7,500 hours of glazing related work experience



Submit a Photo of applicant

Achieving Certification: In addition to meeting the programs Prerequisites, candidates must pass an assessment to become AGMT-certified. The assessment is divided into two tests, a Knowledge-based test (KBT) and a Performancebased test (PBT).

Knowledge-based (KBT): The knowledge-based test is a 125-question, multiple choice test for which candidate will have 2 hours to complete.

Performance-based Test (PBT): The performance-based test is broken into three (3) seperately timed Sections.

- Curtainwall (3-1/2 hour time limit)
- Storefront/Entrance (2 hour time limit)
- Sealants (45 minute time limit)

The AGMT Certification Program provides the industry with a much needed tool to recognize the most qualified architectural glass and metal techicians.

SPOTLIGHT

PAINTERS UNION LOCAL 265

The 1890s was a time of great strife for men and women who lived in the southeast suburbs of Chicago in communities known as Roseland and Pullman. This was a time when industrial giants such as George M. Pullman formed an empire in railroading. He built a community named after himself, demanded that his employees work shifts of 12 to 14 hours daily, seven days a week, live in company owned homes, and shop in company owned stores. He did provide credit but charged heavy interest rates. He controlled the natural gas and water in his model city by charging inflated prices of six to seven times what he paid. Churches were provided, but saloons or brothels were not allowed in his community. Pullman would not allow public speaking, and absolutely NO UNION activity was tolerated.

Thirteen men were determined to overcome the powers of George M. Pullman and his servile type existence for his employees and families. Together they founded Painters Union Local #265 on October 13, 1892 and were chartered on October 14, 1892.

George M. Pullman fought hard to discourage unions by dismissing anyone involved in union activity and banning them from his community.

Six of the original thirteen men
that formed the charter used aliases,
transferred or were dropped within the first
year for fear that serious repercussions would
occur from George M. Pullman if they were
found to be involved in organizing.

Today we salute these men for their fortitude to stand up to industrial giants like George M. Pullman and for their foresight to organize, bring dignity and wellbeing to the men and women of this great country.

We salute these men...and I am sure they would be proud today as they were over 124 years ago.

Now let's fast forward to the past years. The local has been very active in community and political volunteering. These relationships we have built with community and political leaders have been very positive and rewarding for our members. With that being said, thank you all that come out to donate your time. We look forward to our continued success with the groundwork our recently retired BMST Mr. John Spiros Jr had laid out for our newly elected BMST Joe Rinehart and Service Director, Mike Cook to lead this great union to the next 124 years.

PAINTERS' DC14 CONTINUES TO WORK ALONGSIDE REBUILDING TOGETHER METRO CHICAGO

Painters District Council 14 is proud to once again partner with Rebuilding Together Metro Chicago. We have expanded our annual rebuilding day volunteer event to encompass 100 days of donated skilled labor for one hundred Chicago Heights and South-Side Chicago homes in need!

25 years ago, John Spiros, Jr. and Rebuilding Together Metro Chicago committed to a partnership of assisting Chicago's residents, whether long-time homeowners interested in preserving their investment, or new ones trying to make their homes safe and livable. Those

efforts continue today as the DC14 Apprenticeship Program donates equipment and members of DC14 selflessly turn out on the weekends to donate their skill where they are needed most, despite the challenges still facing us with COVID. Measures are being taken to ensure necessary safety protocols are being met.

Rebuilding Together started in 1973 as a small group of people in Midland, Texas realized their neighbors' homes had fallen into disrepair and they could not afford to fix them. They volunteered their time and skills to rehabilitate the residences. Seeing the beneficial impact of their work as an ongoing mission they officially formed a group called Christmas in April, with the intent of







performing similar repair and rehabilitation work in their community every April.

News of their charitable work spread slowly, but eventually achieved national recognition. As it gained momentum, the mission expanded beyond providing annual service in April to bringing together partners and teams of volunteers to help improve neighborhoods throughout the year. More residents could now enjoy lives of warmth, safety and independence. They eventually opened the national office in 1988 and became Rebuilding Together.

Today, Rebuilding Together has grown into a premier nonprofit community revitalization organization.

With corporate and community partners like DC14 and its' members they repair homes, restore communities and revitalize lives. By focusing on specific neighborhoods each year, and collaborating with other community revitalization initiatives, Rebuilding Together Metro

Chicago has been able to maximize and sustain its positive impact on the lives of local community residents. Their local affiliates and nearly 100,000 volunteers complete about 10,000 rebuild projects nationwide each year.

Membership Assistance Program (MAP)

HELP IS AVAILABLE

Let's be honest, LIFE IS HARD and STRESS IS REAL.

Everyone is balancing family, work, friends, hobbies, the COVID Pandemic, and a million other things. This all creates more stress for all of those involved. We all must find a way to deal with this stress and maintain our Mental Health. Just as we take care of our bodies and try to stay healthy, we must remember to take care of our minds.

Unfortunately, there are some upsetting statistics within the construction industry. Opioid abuse and addiction are at an all time high. The biggest increase has been detected in the construction trades. Prescriptions for opioids account for over 20% of the total drugs prescribed for our members. Deaths by suicide have increased over 34% since 1999 and are 4 times higher in construction than any other workplace.

DC 14 members have a distinct advantage in combatting these issues. Two free programs exist to assist members in need. Our Membership Assistance Program (MAP) is run by the highly acclaimed Northwestern Medicine Group. MAP provides for CONFIDENTIAL assistance for personal or work-related issues through assessment, short-term counseling, and/or in referral

services if more in depth services are required. Services are available for (but not limited to) marital-family issues, stress-depression, substance abuse, grief-trauma, financial-legal difficulties, and childcare. It only takes one phone call: 1-888-933-1327 to get the assistance started.

The second available program is provided from the IUPAT. This initiative is called Helping Hands and its goal is to save lives by helping members who may need assistance with substance abuse, suicide intervention or overall mental health stability. DC 14 has recognized the importance of each member's mental health and therefore has taken a proactive approach. Your Business Representatives, Field Representatives, Organizers, JATC and Office staff have all been recently certified in Mental Health First Aid. This does not make us therapists but will allow us to recognize potential issues and assist membership when they may need it the most.
